Please put your name on the back of the photo and they will be returned unharmed.

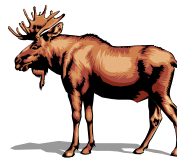

## STATE OF MAINE - DR. DORA MILLS

As you may know, we have identified an increasing number of cases of Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) in horses in Maine this past 3 weeks. We now have confirmed 6 horses with EEE, and there are several more suspicious cases being tested in our laboratory. Although there appears to be a focus of EEE in Waldo County, we have also identified it in York, Cumberland, and Penobscot Counties. Since this infection is transmitted to humans and horses by mosquitoes that mainly reside in wetlands, the risk is probably much broader geographically.

EEE is an especially fatal disease in children and youth, killing one-third of those with symptoms; and for those who survive, half are left with permanent brain damage. There is no vaccine or specific treatment for humans with EEE. Therefore, prevention is very important.

Below is a health advisory we issued on Thursday with the pasted in precautions we are recommending, including some that are specific to schools. I and others met at the Mt. View Community School on Thursday evening, and talked with the school principal and athletic director there about these recommendations. They and Maine Department of Education advised that I send you this information since you have direct connections with schools' athletic directors.

With colder evenings and more frosts on the way, I suspect the recommendations below will not apply to too many more events. I have noticed mosquito activity declining rapidly the past 3 weeks. But, in the southern half of the state there are likely to be some warm evenings with mosquito activity. Additionally, some schools I know take field trips to marshes and bogs this time of year.

Steps people should take to protect themselves from EEE include:

- \* Using an US CDC-recommended effective insect repellent on skin and clothing such as DEET or Picaridin or an Oil of lemon eucalyptus;
- \* Covering up with long-sleeve shirts, pants and socks when outdoors;
- \* Placing mosquito netting over infant carriers when outdoors with infants;
- \* Limiting and even rescheduling outdoor evening activities (starting 1 hour before sunset) when the temperature is 60 degrees or more and before there are several deep frosts, especially in areas near wetlands and where EEE has been detected;\*
- \* Cleaning up unnecessary standing water around the yard to reduce mosquito habitats; and
- \* Vaccinating their horses annually.

\*It is especially important during the next several weeks, before there are several deep frosts and while mosquitoes are still active, that if temperatures are expected to be above 60 degrees, schools and other entities serving youth and elders should ensure that their outdoor activities end before one hour prior to sunset. Schools taking trips into wetlands or areas of identified EEE at any time of day, if the temperature is 60 degrees or above, should assure parents are aware of protection measures such as insect repellent and clothes that cover up, and children have access to these measures.
